
With a bushland-inspired front garden, melding into a spacious backyard landscape filled with exotic plants, it's hard to believe 'Woodcote' occupies just half an acre. Designed to be an idyllic escape within suburbia, it's arranged as an informal garden of rooms, where not everything is seen at first glance and where boundaries become obscured by vegetation. The garden features a mindboggling array of plant species and hard landscapes are kept to a minimum natural materials such as rocks and pebbles are the preferred choices here. At the lowest point of the garden is a pretty, naturalistic pond fed by a pebble stream that meanders through the landscape.

- 1. Vast trees like this elm are the inheritance of many a gardener. You can work with them by planting shade lovers beneath - a cluster of Japanese buxus balls looks fabulous.
- 2. Artistic touches really bring a garden to life. Here, this pebble mosaic, made by cutting out a stencil and carefully placing each stone in place, evokes the gnarled branches of a tree.
- 3. You can consider replacing part of your lawn with a timber deck. It makes the ideal outdoor living room - in fresh air!
- 4. When planting out garden beds, try using a mix of plant forms, textures and shades of green - this will ensure your garden looks good year round. You can throw a pop of red in there too, like a Japanese maple for a focal point.
- 5. Why have an unsightly shed when you can turn it into a 'cottage among the trees'?
